ICOPA 2018 Invitation:



At the Council Meeting of the WFP Daegu, South Korea was elected host city for the XIV International Congress of Parasitology (ICOPA) in 2018. The Korean Society for Parasitology and Tropical Medicine (KSP) will have the honour to be the host Society. We highly appreciate the Mexican organization, the WFP Council members and the President of WFP, Professor Alan Cowman for making the ICOPA XIII very successful, and for selecting Korea as the host in 2018.

In 2018 KSP looks forward to share our experiences with other parasitologists around the world. KSP's development goes hand in hand with Korea's modern history. Almost 90% of the population suffered from parasitic infections after the Korean War in 1953. Through a long-term national campaign and the hard work of Korean parasitologists', the intestinal parasitic infection rate went down to under 3%. Korea became a member of OECD's Development Assistance Committee as the only country in the Committee that went from recipient to donor, and we are committed to sharing the know-how we gained from our experience. Since 1995, with grants from KOICA and NGOs, members of KSP have taken part in development assistance programs to control neglected tropical diseases in Asia, South America, and Africa. KSP is also focused on research. Since 1963, KSP has been publishing the Korean Journal of Parasitology, now indexed by SCI. 2018 marks the 60th anniversary of KSP's establishment. We would like to invite colleagues from around the world to celebrate our birthday together.

KSP will do everything that can make ICOPA XIV a successful, meaningful and fun congress for everyone. The ICOPA XIV will be held from September 9th to 13th, 2018 (exact dates to be confirmed), which is the best time to visit Korea. The main venue will be EXCO in Daegu. Our



proposed theme is "Parasites: Harms and Benefits". The core academic program will include plenary sessions, parallel symposia, and more. We will also arrange a student-mentor program, charity auction, and a Parasite Photomicrograph Exhibition as well as lectures for the general public. We will prepare a welcome reception, gala dinner and a party for young professionals. We will also have a variety of cultural programs for participants and accompanying persons. We will offer various support to participants as much as

possible.

Korea is a beautiful and exciting country where the old and new coexist. The popularity of K-pop and TV dramas has made Korea the preferred choice for a new generation of visitors. The venue will be in Daegu which is located in the southeast of Korea and is the third largest city in the country. It is a clean, safe and modern city. Especially Daegu is near the most beautiful tourist attractions in the

country. There are four UNESCO Cultural Heritage Sites within an hour's drive. Attractions include



Haeinsa Temple, Bulguksa Temple, and Seokguram Grotto - crown jewels in Korea's historical legacy. Korea is very reachable from most locations worldwide. From Incheon Airport, there are connecting flights to Daegu, and the high speed train takes 2 hours and 40 minutes and leaves directly from Incheon Airport. There are 32 hotels, traditional hanok houses and student housings to suit all budgets.

KSP will work together with WFP, international board members, and all our colleagues, and certainly make ICOPA XIV beneficial to all participants, from all countries. Please note the date, September 9-13th, 2018, and visit Korea to be a part of ICOPA XIV.
